THE BIG IDEA

In Israel's plight in Egypt, we see the human problem: we are held captive by our own sins, oppressed by the tyranny of evil, and enslaved by the inevitability of death.

OPENING

- What storylines from movies or books did you most identify with as a child?
- What answers to the question, "What is the human problem" do you hear most often?

DIGGING DEEPER

- Bible scholar N. T. Wright suggests that Colossians 1:13-14 evokes the Exodus story. How was Pharoah's Egypt in Exodus 1:8-13 a "domain of darkness"?
- Colossians 1:14 uses the word "redemption." At its root, this word refers to paying a
 price to purchase a slave's freedom. Most often in the Bible, this word is looking
 back at the Exodus story. How does Exodus 6:6 support this idea? How is this idea
 used in Ephesians 1:7?
- Pastor Tim talked about an unseen realm of evil that opposes God and what God wants. What does Ephesians 6:11-17 teach about this unseen realm? How should Christians respond to it?
