THE BIG IDEA

The resurrection of Jesus reminds us that we are not at the end of our stories. Death, heartbreak, and endings don't have the final word.

OPENING

DIGGING DEEPER

- Read Luke 24:1-12. How do these verses connect with what happens in verses 13-33?
- According to verse 17, why didn't Cleopas and his companion recognize Jesus at first? Why do you think God did this? When did they recognize him? (see verses 31 and 35).
- Reformed Bible scholar William Hendrickson says, "How was it that in the breaking of the bread they suddenly recognized him? Did they see the marks of the nails in his hands? Was it the manner in which he broke the bread and gave it to them that opened their eyes? Or was it the way he spoke to his Father that refreshed their memories? Whatever may be the answer, the body of his resurrection now possessed qualities enabling him to appear at will and also, as here, to vanish at will." Why do you think Jesus' body possessed these unique qualities after his resurrection?
